## Poetry vocabulary

Poem- A poem is a collection of spoken or written words that expresses ideas or emotions in a powerfully vivid and imaginative style. A poem is like a song in that is rhythmic.

Poet-the author of a poem.
Title-the name of the poem found at the top.

Stanza-a verse; a group of lines in a poem organised together, like a paragraph
Lines-first line in this poem is 'I will put in the box,' second line is 'the swish of a silk sari on a summer night,' Lines are not the same as sentences, sentences can run over more than one line in a poem. The ending of a line can sometimes rhyme.
Alliteration-the first sound of each word in a group of words is the same. E.g. tongue twisters use alliteration Peter Piper picked a peck of pickled peppers or She sells seashells on the seashore. Try saying those lines very quickly again and again!
